Training

Keeshonden are intelligent and eager to learn, but like all breeds, they benefit from early socialization and training. Positive reinforcement techniques work especially well with Keeshonden. They respond best to gentle, consistent training that rewards their efforts with treats, toys, or affection.

Here are a few tips for training your Keeshond puppy:

Start Early: Begin socialization and basic obedience training as soon as possible to establish good habits. Be Patient and Consistent: Keeshonden are sensitive dogs who respond well to encouragement. Patience and consistent routines will help reinforce good behavior.

Positive Training: Positive dog training techniques focus on rewarding desired behaviors with treats, praise, or toys rather than using punishment. This approach helps dogs develop confidence and promotes long-term behavior changes.

Mental Stimulation: Keeshonden are intelligent and curious, so provide plenty of mental challenges, such as puzzle toys and learning new tricks, to keep their minds engaged.

Grooming

Keeshonden have a beautiful double coat, which, with proper care, remains a source of pride and joy for both the dog and the owner. Regular grooming is essential to keep your Keeshond's skin and coat healthy and reduce shedding. Your breeder will help guide you in what tools to use for grooming, and may offer a demonstration if you need.

Here are a few grooming basics:

Brushing: Brush your Keeshond at least once a week to prevent matting, remove loose hair, and maintain the coat's natural beauty. During shedding seasons (spring and fall), more frequent brushing may be necessary.

Bathing: Bathe your Keeshond only as needed, as too-frequent baths can strip their coat of natural oils. Nail Trimming: Regular nail trimming is important for your dog's comfort and health. Aim to trim nails every 2-3 weeks. "Lick mats" are a good way to make nail trims less stressful for your pup!

Dental Care: Start a dental care routine early with regular brushing or dental chews to promote good oral

Things You Can Do with Your Puppy

Keeshonden are versatile dogs who thrive in various activities. As you get to know your puppy, consider exploring some fun options for mental and physical engagement. We recommend enrolling in local puppy classes which are a great way to bond with your puppy and start their socializing, and from there, there are many available activities for you to pursue. There are some examples below, your breeder will be able to help connect you to resources and training clubs in your area if you would like to know more!

Obedience is a training discipline focused on teaching dogs to perform specific commands and behaviors, such as sit, stay, heel, and recall, with precision and reliability. This training builds a strong foundation for good behavior, enhances communication between dog and handler, and is often showcased in formal competitions.

Fast CAT (Coursing Ability Test) is a timed 100-yard dash where dogs chase a lure, with their speed calculated in miles per hour to assess their natural drive and athleticism. It's a high-energy event that allows dogs to showcase their running abilities in a safe and fun environment.

Rally is a sport that combines elements of traditional obedience with a fun, interactive course. Handlers guide their dogs through a series of stations, each with a sign instructing a specific obedience task (like sit, stay, or heel), emphasizing teamwork and communication.

Agility is a popular and fun activity for many Kees and their owners! With their natural aptitude and energy, many Keeshonden excel in agility courses. Agility training builds confidence and provides an outlet for their playful spirit.

Barn hunt is a scent-based dog sport that taps into a dog's natural hunting instincts, challenging them to locate and indicate the presence of a hidden rat (safely contained in a ventilated tube) within a maze of

straw bales. It's a fun and mentally stimulating activity that allows dogs of all breeds to use their noses and problem-solving skills.

Therapy Work; Keeshonden's natural gentleness and friendliness make them wonderful candidates for therapy work, brightening lives in hospitals, schools, and nursing homes.

Conformation Showing; For those interested in the show ring, Keeshonden are a pleasure to show and have a long history of success in dog shows.

There are many other activities and sports you can pursue such as scentwork, herding, flyball and dock diving.
